Dawn Riley gave a wonderful online talk about her sailing career and her initiatives designed to bring more young people, especially women, into the sport of sailing.

Dawn was part of the first all-female crew to compete in the Whitbread 'round the world race in 1989-1990. The story is documented in the movie "Maiden." She opened with a background video to bring everyone up to date on her career from 1989 to 2021. She discussed the film "Maiden" and also talked about her current project Oakcliff and the future of competitive sailing (FMI see: <a href="https://www.oakcliffsailing.org/">https://www.oakcliffsailing.org/</a>) She also shared her insights into the Olympics and America's Cup.




# **The Maine Island Trail Association** – April 22

Doug Welch, Executive Director of the Maine Island Trail Association led an online conversation about "green water" cruising on the coast of



Maine. The Maine Island Trail is a 375-mile water trail for boaters extending the length of the Maine coast. A recreational water trail, it connects 246 wild islands and mainland sites open for day use or overnight camping. Site owners allow access to their properties trusting that MITA members and other users will be responsible stewards during their visits. There is no official route along the Trail, and most users choose to explore it gradually over time.

### Romantic Adventures with Guy & Nina Jones – December 16



Guy and Nina Jones gave an amazingly comprehensive presentation on their 2018-2020 circumnavigation experiences and involvement with a 'World ARC Challenge.' This presentation was the first of several; the last two were held in 2022.



Guy began sailing in 1973, one day after graduating from college. In 2011, he purchased *Footloose*, a cutter rigged 2003 Cabo Rico 45 and in 2017, after extensive modifications, he set off on his dream voyage of sailing around the world. That same year in Germany, 6,000 miles away, Nina who only recently began sailing embarked as crew on her own circumnavigation.

Their voyages started out on different boats in different countries, but circumstances brought them together in Panama. Nine months later they were married, and they have been cruising together ever since. Guy now has approximately 105,000 offshore miles and Nina has about 32,000.
